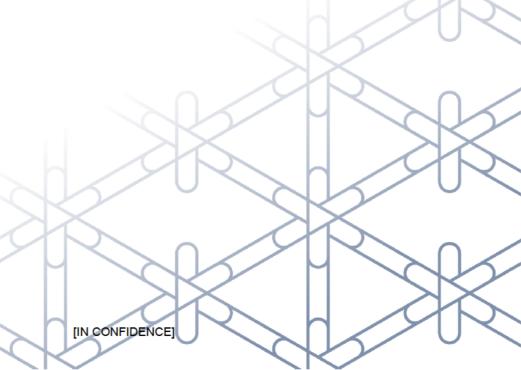

General Board governance matters

1	Welcome / context sharing updates Lead: Chair / All					
	The Chair opened the meeting and acknowledged delegates attending for absent Chief Executives. With more international focus from the new government, MFAT has been invited to attend Board meetings - the Chair welcomed Victoria Hallum to the meeting.					
	It was noted that the Minister of Climate Change would be having his first bilateral meeting with the Prime Minister later in the day.					
2	Initial CPMG meeting (March) Lead: Chair / Lisa Daniell (Climate IEB Unit)					
	The first CPMG meeting will likely be held in late March. This meeting will discuss the purpose of the group, terms of reference, and provide an overview of the climate change architecture, including domestic and international mitigation and adaptation, and legal obligations.					
	 Discussion points: Sequencing will be important, given ministerial priorities are still being clarified and some agencies have resource constraints. s 9(2)(f)(iv) 					
	There are tight timeframes for key pieces of work, which will require ministerial decision making in the near future. \$ 9(2)(g)(i)					
	 Ministers will have an opportunity to see ERP2 modelling in the second CPMG meeting. A Board meeting will be scheduled prior to the initial CPMG meeting. 					
	An important conversation at the first CPMG meeting will be the government's objectives for ETS pricing					
	The Board:					
	 2.1 provided feedback on the proposed purpose, functions, and priorities of the Climate Priorities Ministerial Group (CPMG); 2.2 discussed the proposed approach to the initial establishment meeting (as outlined in paragraph 8 of the paper), particularly any insights on Ministers' understanding of the framework for climate change in New Zealand and the broader climate programme, alongside economic priorities; 					
	2.3 agreed to the proposed draft framework for quarterly reporting to CPMG on milestones and progress across the climate work					

programme.

Board's role and focus for 2024

Lead: Chair / Lisa Daniell (Climate IEB Unit)

The paper sets out proposed objectives and functions for the Board, to support delivery of the government's climate priorities. It focuses on crosscutting areas of work. International mitigation is included given this is a priority for the government.

The Board's feedback is sought on the proposed objectives and functions, and whether any other issues need to be included.

Discussion points:

- Strategic clarity of what is being focused on is an area for the Board to contribute to, s 9(2)(g)(i)
- Ensuring Ministers are well sighted on the biggest policy decisions needing to be made, where they intersect portfolios; framing around the nature of these decisions and where they are at in the process of decision making.
- More focus is needed on an adaptation framework, including the legislative framework.
- s 9(2)(f)(iv)

The Board:

- 3.1 **noted** the proposed objectives and functions that the Board needs to deliver in 2024 and provided feedback on the proposed areas;
- 3.2 agreed that decision-making needs to be streamlined between the Board, Climate Deputy Chief Executives Group, and Interagency Climate Directors Group to ensure that decisions are made by the most appropriate group.

Decision-making is to be streamlined between the Board, DCEs, and Directors to avoid decisions being cascaded. Lead: Climate IEB Unit

Climate mitigation

4 ERP2 update, including update on CCC advice Lead: Sam Buckle / Stephen Goodman (MfE)

DCEs discussed this item at their meeting on 27 February. Greater clarity is needed on how much to prioritise a net zero strategy ahead of or alongside ERP2, and the upcoming quadrilateral is a key opportunity to do so (Ministers Willis, Brown, McClay and Watts).

The paper regarding the Climate Change Commission's recommendations was provided to DCEs for awareness, given its importance, § 9(2)(q)(i)

DCEs were comfortable with where the discussion landed but expressed concerns around the proposed timeframes for a Net Zero Strategy and ERP deliverables.

Discussion points:

• It would be helpful to clarify the scope and timing of a Net Zero Strategy with Ministers as soon as possible.

The Board:

- 4.1 **noted** the implications of a net zero strategy for agencies' forward work planning;
- 4.3 **noted** that agencies will need to continue to work with focus towards preparing a discussion document for ERP2 consultation to commence at the end of May.

Climate adaptation

5 Adaptation framework work programme

Lead: Katherine Wilson (MfE)

It is likely that an ad hoc select committee will be established, to allow more time for the Cabinet process and give agencies additional time to work through core objectives and questions. The Board had previously asked for an indication of issues where Ministers will need to make difficult decisions. Paragraph 14 of the paper highlights key challenging issues and the Board's feedback is sought on whether any other challenges should be included.

DCEs discussed this item on 27 February and noted the importance of sequencing; there was particular focus on paragraph 14(b) and (c) in regard to the appropriate balance.

Discussion points:

- The adaptation of natural ecosystems due to changing climate is out of scope of the adaptation framework. The natural environment is within scope. Built environment sits within infrastructure and would come through the adaptation plan rather than the adaptation framework.
- Scope of the adaptation framework is a key aspect to highlight in the first Cabinet paper.
- A range of boundary issues need to be explored through policy development, with focus largely on the residential environment.
- Non-climate induced natural hazards (e.g. earthquakes) are not included in the scope of the proposed framework.
- MfE and Treasury are working on a core objective in the adaptation framework around effectively functioning insurance markets.
- The Chair noted the Board would value the opportunity to see the most consequential policy issues and options being put forward, given the impact on a range of different policy issues.

The Board:

- 5.1 **noted** the draft objectives for the climate adaptation framework (outlined in Appendix 3 of the paper) will be further developed with agencies;
- 5.2 noted that direction from Climate DCEs or the Board may be needed to support ministerial decision making on cross-cutting issues.

Chair's closing comments / karakia whakamutunga

The Chair noted that due to time constraints the report back on potential adaptation indicators (agenda item 6) would be deferred to a subsequent meeting.

The Minister of Climate Change (MCC) has met with the Prime Minister to discuss the climate portfolio. The meeting included discussion on the Climate Priorities Ministerial Group (CPMG), the ETS, and the NDC. CPMG will be chaired by the MCC and the Prime Minister will be invited to attend the first meeting to set the scene and outline expectations for the group. s 9(2)(f)(iv)2 CPMG preparation for initial meeting – update on agenda and papers, comments, or review on quarterly progress report Lead: Chair / Lisa Daniell (Climate IEB Unit) The Board discussed the proposed agenda for the first CPMG meeting on The Climate IEB Unit will 25 March. Feedback included the following key points: circulate information provided to s 9(2)(f)(iv)the Minister of Climate Change s 9(2)(f)(iv)New Zealand needs to report to the UN this year on progress made against NDC1 s 9(2)(f)(iv)

- A short update on the Board's latest quarterly report will be provided to CPMG, which includes a section on the new government's priorities. The Climate IEB Unit is preparing a 1-2 page summary of key messages, with the final quarterly report to be provided to the Minister of Climate Change.
- On the emissions projections and how those are described, ensure it
 is clear there is still heavy lifting to do for EB2 and through ERP2, and
 significant uncertainty in the numbers given time passed since July '23
 and assumptions at that time.
- The quarterly report narrative assumes a continuously rising ETS price – also need to clarify what underpins aspects of that modelling in the projections.
- The government has to respond on ERP2 by December.
- Cabinet decisions on NDC2 will be needed by February 2025.

The Board:

- 2.1 **noted** the draft agenda for the first CPMG meeting on 25 March 2024;
- 2.2 agreed that the quarterly progress report should be summarised for CPMG to allow discussion to focus on priority matters (NDC);
- 2.2 noted that additional feedback on the draft CPMG agenda is welcome by email to the Climate IEB Unit.

Quarterly progress report to be summarised for CPMG consideration Lead: Climate IEB Unit – completed summary to CPMG; more fulsome report to be updated and circulated

separately to MCC.

Chair's closing comments / karakia whakamutunga

The Chair acknowledged the challenges with agency consultation occurring alongside ministerial consultation on some of the draft Cabinet papers.

The Chair noted the value in having as many Board members as possible attend CPMG on 25 March.

Next meeting: Wednesday 3 April 2024 (focus on external engagements)

Businesses are responding to economic and customer drivers, beyond government direction:

- Market access,
- Capital / investor
- Consumer / Customer
- Legal
- Access to talent

Businesses have completed transition plans (or will do so) and are on a pathway to 2030 and 2050.

- This is very different to ERP1 (in-built momentum)

These transition plans identify significant physical and climate risks for the sectors/economy but also lay out fundamental pathways for transition, which the Government can draw upon.

- Risks (physical, transitional, financial stability)
- Pathways emerging in dairy, energy etc

There are economic opportunities (or costs) for the economy:

- Opps: Productivity, co-benefits, premiums for low carbon products
- Costs: Cost of inaction, late / rapid decarbonisation, capital, insurance etc

Businesses wants to partner with Government:

- Setting ambition and certainty of direction
- Removing regulatory barriers
- Catalysing private sector investment, including through co-investment
- Engaging NZers
